We come together to **HONOR** women who have given or who evidence a potential for distinctive service in any field of education. Congratulations to you all!

## **GSO** Powerful Sisters Inspire

Mary Frances Early, a member of GSO's Alpha Chapter, was the first African-American to earn a degree from the University of Georgia. Among her many honors, she has received the STAR Teacher Award, Benjamin E. Mays Black Music Heritage Award, University of Georgia Outstanding Alumna Award, and the Foot Soldier for Equal Justice Award. In 2013, she was presented with an honorary doctorate of law degree from the University of Georgia, which was only the 79<sup>th</sup> honorary doctoral degree conferred in the university's 263-year history. The UGA School of Education was renamed the Mary Frances Early College of Education in her honor on February 25, 2020.

Ruby Anderson began teaching English at Athens High School when she was 17 years old and taught for more than 50 years. A DKG member, she was the first teacher inducted in the Georgia Teacher Hall of Fame, is recognized in Georgia Women of Achievement, and was featured in a recent article in the Atlanta Journal-Constitution. She was appointed by President Eisenhower to the Educational Policies Commission of the National Education Association. Upon her death in 1978, she left a bequest to the University of Georgia to establish a scholarship fund for secondary teachers pursuing graduate degrees. The Ruby Anderson Scholarships are still being awarded.





## DKG: About the Society

## **Founding the Society**

On May 11, 1929, a few friends of Dr. Annie Webb Blanton gathered at 2610 Whitis Avenue in Austin, Texas. The large two-story, red brick house with its Victorian cupolas was listed in the telephone directory as the University Faculty Women's Club. Great oaks shaded the veranda where Dr. Blanton greeted her Austin friends and those who had come by train to help her found The Delta Kappa Gamma Society.

The founding group of twelve women educators represented a cross-section of the teaching profession. There was a grade school teacher, a dean of women, three high school teachers, three elementary school principals, and four college professors – Dr. Blanton was a professor of rural education at the University of Texas. In addition to Dr. Blanton, five of the members were

from Austin: Anna Hiss, Helen Koch, Lalla M. Odom, Cora M. Martin and Ruby Terrill (Lomax). Already looking ahead to the formation of other chapters across Texas, Dr. Blanton had invited to membership six

women educators from cities outside of Austin: Mamie Bastian from Houston, Ruby Cole from San Antonio, Lela Lee Williams from Dallas, Mabel Grizzard from Waxahachie, and Ray King and Sue King from Fort Worth.

## **Purposes**

Twelve women met in 1929 on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin with noble aspirations to build an organization to promote women in education and bring recognition and respect to their profession. The result of their planning was the founding of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. These Founders created a list of five Purposes which were intended to guide the organization. This number later grew to seven. These Purposes are as relevant today as they were in 1929.

genuine spiritual fellowship.

Delta Kappa Gamma members expand their friendships and increase their appreciation of women educators at home and abroad through travel, participation in international organizations, chapter meetings, conferences, workshops and conventions. seminars, travel and study experiences, projects and programs. World Fellowship grants provide opportunities for extended communication and understanding. A gift from the Emergency Fund to a member who suffers extensive loss due to a natural disaster is a manifestation of spiritual fellowship.

To unite women educators of the world in a

To honor women who have given or who evidence a potential for distinctive service in any field of education.

The Founders sought to initiate outstanding women educators who could achieve still more when stimulated by association with other professional educators. Membership in the Society continues to carry recognition of superior potential and accomplishment. Women educators are honored by being invited to affiliate with a select group of women who have been successful in professional and personal relationships. Honorary membership may be extended to women who have made significant contributions to education and/or the advancement of women educators but who are not eligible for active membership.

To advance the professional interest and position of women in education.

One of the chief motivations for the founding of the Society was Dr. Annie Webb Blanton's belief that qualified women educators should be given equal opportunities in all areas of professional work. Members of the Society have been influential in bringing about promotion opportunities and single salary schedules. Through scholarship programs, the Society endeavors to encourage and assist members to advance their professional interests, competencies, and positions. Projects supported by the Golden Gift Fund, such as the DKG Ignite and special stipends, advance the work of the Society.

To initiate, endorse and support desirable legislation or other suitable endeavors in the interests of education and of women educators.

Members of the Society consistently support efforts on a non-partisan basis to support desirable legislation or other suitable endeavors that encourage improvements in education. At all levels the Society has cooperated with other professional organizations in support of legislation to advance education and/or the status of women in education. State organizations and chapters have led in organizing activities that relate to the rights of women educators in the civic and political life of their respective communities.

To endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study and to grant fellowships to nonmember women educators.

The first national scholarship of \$1,000 for graduate study was awarded in 1940. As many as 31 DKG International scholarships are now awarded each year to members pursuing advanced degrees. Voluntary contributions by members to the international World Fellowship Fund afford women from other countries \$4,000 graduate study awards to study at universities in the United States or Canada. GSO awards annual scholarships for work on graduate degrees or certificate add-ons.



To stimulate the personal and professional growth of members and to encourage their participation in appropriate programs of action.

The Society encourages and assists the personal and professional growth of members for effective participation as educators and civic leaders. Leadership development opportunities and workshops are conducted by the Society. Members are encouraged to plan, implement, and evaluate programs of study and action.



To inform the members of current economic, social, political and educational issues so that they may participate effectively in a world society.

Programs, seminars, publications, and travel and study experiences are provided to assist members in expanding their knowledge, in studying current issues, and in enriching their personal lives. Rich interpersonal relationships and challenging personal experiences provide opportunities for effective participation in a world society.

## **Society Symbols**

To build community spirit and a sense of belonging, Dr. Blanton and her colleagues selected colors to symbolize their courage and loyalty in the face of opposition, symbols, a key pin, a motto, a song, and Purposes to bind them together with a common focus. We focus less on the colors and symbols and more on the values they represent: courage, loyalty, learning, perseverance.



Our key is a golden ellipse. Across its center are the Greek letters. Above them a wreath of laurel leaves symbolizes the distinction which those who wear this key have achieved. Below the letters is a cup which represents knowledge.



Our coat of arms consists of a red shield with a band of gold. Three Tudor roses on the band symbolize the Society's ideals of friendship, loyalty and helpfulness. The flaming lamp and the

open book on the shield signify scholarship and knowledge. The laurel sprays are the traditional symbols of achievement.

## **GSO Early History**

From Celebrating 70 Years of Psi State written by Dr. Gloria H. Bienstock

Psi State, Georgia, an affiliate of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, was organized on November 28, 1936 at the Henry Grady Hotel in Atlanta, Georgia, by Mamie Sue Bastian, International Founder. The first state officers for 1936-1938 elected at this meeting were President, Eva L. Thornton; First Vice President, Ethel Massengale; Second Vice President, Mosie Slocumb; Treasurer, Charlotte G. Smith; Recording Secretary, Margaret Harris Blair; Corresponding Secretary, Dorothy Hains; and Parliamentarian, Melville Doughty.

Psi State chapter members spent the first two years learning about Society purposes and committee work as well as duties and responsibilities of membership. Charter members from throughout Georgia involved themselves with national issues and legislation. Ethel Massengale, Psi State Historian, kept records from 1936-1950. By 1938 the state leaders were ready to organize local chapters.

From 1938-1946, Psi State members organized eight chapters throughout Georgia:

Psi State meetings took place in Atlanta and Athens. One founder, Nancy Porter, resigned from the organization while serving as state recording secretary. That year, Psi State voted for International Executive Secretary, Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, to receive a salary. Other interesting facts that year included the appointment of recruits, Annette Highsmith and Jan Forrester, to the nominating committee on their initiation day. Kate Downs, another initiate,

accepted the position as parliamentarian. Psi State officers kept their posts from 1940-1944, with the war effort being the probable cause. They changed the 1940 budget from \$155 to \$255 in order to work diligently on major issues of retirement and tenure.

During the war years, Psi State, with a membership of 127 members with five chapters, emphasized teaching as an essential wartime service. Chapters throughout Georgia influenced legislation that included the Teacher Retirement bill and the Minimum Foundation Program for Education. Chapters stressed teacher salaries and cost of living increases by writing letters to public officials and legislators. Although many of the local and state meetings had to be discontinued due to the war, members continued work on Pioneer Women projects, working specifically on recruiting teachers and emphasizing teaching as essential service in War Emergency. Two chapters met quotas for Victory Bonds. In addition, Delta Kappa Gamma members

volunteered their time, talents and funds for war-related activities, United Service Organization (USO), Red Cross Service, scrap drives, registration for war Ration Books, knitting for troops, armed services enlistment, patriotic programs, bond purchases, radio plays, canteen classes, civil defense, salvage campaigns, favors for hospitals, blood donations, and victory gardens. Their slogan— "peace, security, and freedom: a heritage for everyone everywhere." In the meantime, new initiates joined the rolls of Delta Kappa Gamma chapters throughout Georgia. The initiation ceremonies, held at state conventions, rendered Delta Kappa Gamma a public presence that was covered by local and state newspapers. Athens, Georgia hosted the Psi State Convention on April 18, 1942, and the Women's Club in Atlanta

hosted the convention on April 15, 1944. By 1944, the emphasis shifted to planning for post-war peace, foreign cultures, and international cooperation. Chapter programs focused on folk music, poetry, art, drama, education, politics, and culture in allied countries such as China, England, Russia, and Latin America. Committees coordinated programs at meetings with themes that carried out the national Society focus on arts, music, dance, hospitality, and punctuality as well as the central themes of world culture, world peace, and personal enrichment.

Throughout the early years, Psi State members endorsed legislation for teacher welfare and teacher retirement. They helped organize future teacher groups at high schools and colleges throughout the state. They sponsored foreign students in local communities. When responding to a request for a "measure of success," one chapter historian

stated that Delta Kappa Gamma does not lend itself to material measurement. It's more than friendship, common interests, worthy goals, and constructive activities. An educational movement, a social process of interaction, an attempt to estimate intrinsic worth, Psi State members embraced the challenge for excellence. Their emphasis, focus, and dedication followed along mutual goals and stressed Society purposes. Most chapters spent their first year or two increasing membership, activating committees for Society work, and finding their local niche in the state and national society. Each of the eight chapters, organized from 1936 to 1946, followed their own particular action plans. Through decades of collaboration, communication, and commitment, these pioneer chapters mesmerize us with Psi State memories. They give us glimpses of truth that touch the depth of Psi State's authentic self.



- One of the main goals of the convention was to make it affordable and accessible to all members. The Convention Committee accomplished that goal even during pandemic.
- Due to the Covid-19 virus the convention committee made the difficult decision to have a virtual convention. The 2023 convention will be held at the same location in Columbus.

- Continue evaluating the convention schedule and procedures.
- Continue looking at how GSO can have affordable, accessible, and safe conventions.
- Continue to look at ways to use more and more technology so that GSO conventions can impact more members and have a lasting effect on education and its leaders.

Awards were granted to those with merit projects. Grants were awarded for the year 2020 in the amount of \$14,978. Grants for year 2021 totaled \$6,825 and will be announced at the 2021 State Convention. All donations to the Elise Boylston Memorial Foundation are tax deductible. All funds received via interest rates, donations from chapters, honorariums and memorials are used to fund grants assisting students and teachers in Georgia.

Research funds for the improvement of education in Georgia continue to be available to teachers, schools, and communities. By increasing the Foundation funds, additional research and enhanced learning opportunities will be available, improving the education of Georgia students.

Assets are listed in the first column. The second column reports the amounts on hand in each fund on March 31 of this year, and the third column reports the amounts on hand at the same time last year. The final column shows the change in the two amounts. Both the building and the scholarship funds show a negative change. The negative change is due to payment of rent on our office space and the distribution of scholarship awards, respectively.




